What is hope? How do I get it? How do I keep it?

Hope is not wishful thinking. It's not rose-colored glasses. And it's not simply an optimistic attitude.

For a Christian, hope is confident expectation. It is knowing and believing that God is who He says He is and is faithful to do what He has said He will do.

For a Christian

Hope is a Person and a Power (Rom 15:13, Heb 6:19, 1 Tim 1:1, Titus 2:13, 1 Pet 1:3)

Hope is a strength to stand (Rom 5:2) and a motivator to live godly (1 Pet 1:3)

Hope is a refuge (Heb 6:18)

Hope is now (1 Cor 13:13, 2 Th 2:16)

Hope is future (Col 1:5)

Hope is to be shared (1 Pet 3:15)







Christians have hope in the face of fear, anxiety, and worry.

Do we live remembering the hope we have, or do we forget?

Jesus is our Anchored Hope (Hebrews 6:19

- On calm waters, He is our anchored Hope to keep us from drifting.
- In turbulent waters, He is our anchored Hope to keep us from drowning.

Anchored hope is peace and confidence in any circumstances, because it's not based on the circumstances. Our hope is based on Jesus— what He has done and what He will do.

When God came in the flesh and dwelt among us (John 1:14, Luke 2:12), hope came in the form of a helpless baby. That baby in the lowly manger grew in wisdom and in stature (Luke 2:40) and entered into the God's service to minister to His people (Mark 10:45) and to give His life for the whole world (John 3:16-17).

1 Pet 1:13 Wherefore gird up the loins of your mind, be sober, and hope to the end for the grace that is to be brought unto you at the revelation of Jesus Christ

The Greek word translated as "gird up" is nepho. it means to abstain from wine (keep sober), (fig.) be discreet:--be sober, watch.

In ancient times, people gathered up their long robes to prepare to do physical work, to walk fast, or to run in a race. Be they farmers heading out into the fields, soldiers going off to battle, or runners in a race, they girded up their clothing to do their work. Peter tells us to gird up our minds, to be sober, and to have HOPE to do our work until Jesus returns.

During this time of Advent, be diligent to share the hope, love, joy, and peace of Jesus.

We have a present hope, an enduring hope, and a future hope. We look forward with know-ledge of what is to be and a confidence that God will bring it about—that's true hope!

What is Advent?

From the Latin word "adventus," meaning arrival.

In the church it is:

- the four weeks preceding the celebration of the birth of our Lord.
- much like Lent that precedes Easter.
- a time of reflection and remembering.
- a long and steady gaze, upward and forward.

Let's "walk through the Word" during the days of Advent, and light our candles of Hope,

Love, Joy and Peace, looking up, with eyes fixed upon our True Hope, Jesus.

Christmas Advent Candle 1 – Advent starts with HOPE: Prophecy Gives Hope

We light an Advent candle each Sunday leading up to Christmas to prepare our hearts by 1. renewing our hope, 2. growing our love, 3. rejoicing in Christ, and 4. finding rest and peace.

Week One of Advent is the Candle of Hope

- In ancient times, God gave His people Israel hope by speaking to them through the prophets. and revealing what was to come.
- He told of the blessings they would receive when Jesus, their Messiah, would dwell with them.
- The people looked forward to the coming of their Messiah and His Kingdom with hope.

We find the same hope when we read the words of the prophets. Christ has come and our hope is in Him, sure and steadfast, an anchor for the soul (Heb 6:19) — a hope that is eternal.

Reflect on the prophecies of old that have been fulfilled in the Person and works of Jesus Christ.

Prophesy: Isaiah 9:6 Fulfillment: Luke 2:11-12, Luke 4:18-19, John 3:16-17


Ponder the wonder of Christ's birth and rejoice in God's gift of Jesus being born.


Consider how Deity transcended time and space, and entered into humanity.
